Alice is also survived by several nieces and nephews. Nieces include: Brenda Howard, Deanna Hoffman, LaDonna Coulter,

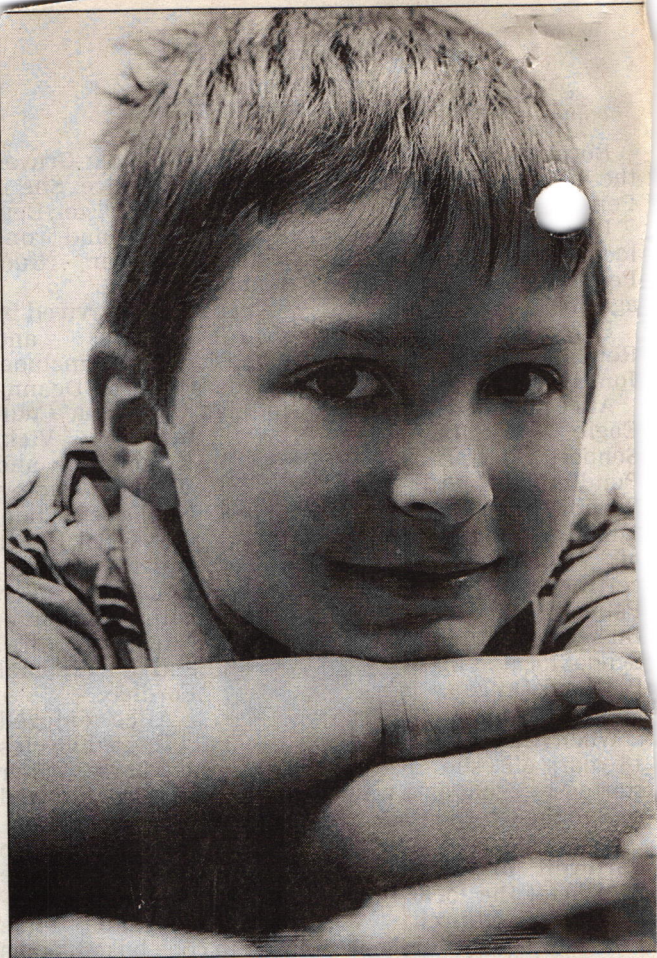
