
Robert W. Collins Sr.


ton. Robert was Greenup, Kentucky, on January 13, 1921, to James Collins and Sarah Worthing ton Collins, the fifth of six children. His early life was spent on a small family farm in the nills of eastern Kentucky, where he developed his lifelong love of the outdoors, nunting, fishing and farming. After the war, Robert re-turned to Kentucky and enrolled at Ashland Junior enrolled at Ashland Junior College, where he met his future wife, Ruth Mae Brooks. They married on September 14, 1946. Robert went on to Centre College of Kentucky and earned his law degree at Vanderbilt Law School in Nashville Tennessee School in Tennessee. Nashville, Robert convinced Ruth that Oregon was their next stop and they moved to Salem, Oregon, in 1951 where their first child, Robert W. Collins Jr., was born. Bob and Ruth moved to Pendleton in 1951, where their other three children, their Michael, Kimberlee, and John, were born. Bob soon joined the Pendleton law firm of Raley, Kilkenny & and began a long Raley and satisfying legal career. For several years he was also a partner in the law firm Fabre, Collins & Kotp with his friends

Kottkamp. After his sons Michael and Robert became lawyers and moved back to Pendleton, Robert founded the Pendleton law firm Collins & Collins in 1980, where he

spent the rest of his career, practicing law with his sons. In 2001, he was recognized by the Oregon State Bar for 50 years of distin-guished legal service in Oregon. Bob was a member of the Oregon State Bar, Pendle-Elks Club, ton Club Kiwanis past member of the Kentucky Bar



Scouts of America. Robert loved to hunt and fish and one of his greatest joys was teaching his many grandkids to fish. He and Ruth loved salmon fishing on the Oregon coast, trav-eling with friends and picking berries and mush-rooming in the Blue Mountains. His greatest pleasure came from the many family celebrations and events at the family home that he and Ruth and Ruth built on McKay Creek. Bob loved the Wallowa Mountains and took the kids on many pack trips to the high lakes

Bob was predeceased by his parents and five siblings. After Ruth's death in 2004, Bob married a childhood friend, Mary Emily Thompson of Louisville, Kentucky. He is survived by his second wife, Mary Emily, children Robert W. Collins Jr. (Donna), Michael B. Collins (Shannon), Kimberlee C. Morrow (Vern), John K. Collins, eleven grandchildren and four great-grandchildren; and Mary Emily's children, Steve Thompson and Sarah Rankin of Louisville, Kentucky, and Anne Lanz of Birmingham, Alabama.
