to the individual units based on need.

"It was built with money that came from tithing funds, not just locally but from throughout the world," Snell said.

Puzey said the general layout of the building is among about half a dozen designs that are used for facilities across the world.

"They determine what size and design is needed and use that pattern," he said.

The previous stake center, located on 11th Street in Hermiston, was originally built in 1967, Snell said. Additions were made in the late '70s and the early '80s. Other buildings in the Hermiston stake include Umatilla, built in 1983 Boardman in 1984 and Lexington in 1987.

Snell said the old stake center had services running each Sunday from 9 a.m. past 6 p.m. — serving four separate congregations and a Spanish-sr group. The new fac vides additional space so meetings don't last so late in the day.

"The units have their own space now and don't have to be jammed into one space," he said.
