Reed was the of three father beautiful children, daughter Sharayah Lehnert of Colorado, son Raiden Lehnert of Pendleton, Ore., and stepdaughter Cassie Amick of Vancouver, Wash. He was married to Stephanie Miller Lehnert in 2013. He took great pride in watching his son Raiden play football.

He loved being an uncle to Reeghan, Raylee, Aubrey and Evan Lehnert. He spent as many hours as he was able supporting them and watching them participate in

sports.
