Richard Nelson "Dick" Jones, 67, passed away October 3, 2013, at St. Anthony Hospital.

Born into a of sports family enthusiasts, Dick participated in baseball, basketball, swimming and football. Dick became accustomed to spotlight at the a young age, first as a Buster Brown shoe model at Anderson S Department

Store, and as a tap dance contestant on the television program "Stairway to the Stars." He continued dance lessons along with sports and also studied balt incurring his dad's and ach's displeasure when he performed in a ballet recital during high school.

A 1964 graduate of Pendleton High School, Dick was a standout athlete in football, baseball, and basketball. He was a Lantern Cup winner and held several positions in the student body. He was also selected to play in the 1964 Shriners All Star game. Dick still holds quarterback records at PHS, and his brother Robert, "Bobby," holds rushing records.

Dick was Pendleton's first and only Parade All American who received that honor in both football and basketball in 1963. Dick was offered football and academic scholarships from over 30 colleges and universities, including BYU, Stanford, Purdue, Notre Dame, Air Force Academy and the Naval Accelemy, as well as a baske 1 scholarship at Davauson. He chose to stay in the Northwest, attending the University of Oregon. Dick attended the U of O

Dick attended the U of O from 1964 to 1968, majoring in litical science and jour alism. He was a member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity. He was the student body president of U of O in 1967-1968. In 1968, he was a page at the Democratic Convention in Chicago. He led demonstrations on the campus, marching in the Poor People's March with Cesar Chavez. He met Hilary Rodham, later Clinton, at a student leadership conference.

> He had many friends in rock & roll, particularly with the Grateful Dead and New Riders of the Purple Sage. He worked at and attended art school in New York.

Dick married Maureen McCormmach, his lifelong fiancee of 18 years, on December 15, 2007. He was an avid community supporter and a friend to all. He was a member of the Elks, the Moose, a Bucks Booster, U of O Association and

Alumni Association and Pendleton Center for the Arts. He was a board member and president of the Oregon East Symphony. He was on the vestry of the Episcopal Church and Oregon Trail Manor Board. Dick was the first person inducted in the Bucks Hall of Fame and served on the Bucks Hall of Fame Board.

Dick was an ardent sports fan all his life, attending most U of O home games and many bowl games with friends in recent years. He loved his friends, his family, music from rock & roll to classical, art, his hometown, and his vacation home at Ocean Park, Washington.

Dick is survived by his wife, Maureen McCormmach; daughters Gretchen Kyle Roedl and Rachael Ruth Leib; stepchildren Steven L. Strelich and Erin A. Strelich; and grandchildren Colton Roedl and Maya Buress. He is also survived by his sisters Rebecca Winter and Marilyn Anderson, and brothers Rodney and Michael Jones. He was preceded in death by his parents and his brother Robert.

Viewing will be held Friday, Oct. 11 from 4-7 p.m. at Pendleton Pioneer Chapel. Services will be held at the Episcopal Church in Pendleton on Saturday, October 12, 2013, at 2 p.m. A reception will follow at the Packard Tavern.

Constitution Day features tribal law


